

Byron R. Gough, 85, passed away peacefully on Saturday, April 19, surrounded by loved ones. A devoted husband, father, grandfather and man of faith, Byron lived a life marked by service, integrity, and kindness.

Byron was also a long-time leader in the Putnam County Soil and Water Conservation District. He served on the North Putnam School Board and was deeply engaged in many other county and community clubs and committees. His dedication to service and leadership reflected his deep commitment to faith, family, and the well-being of his community.

Byron graduated from Purdue University in 1961 with a degree in Animal Sciences. After college, he served as a U.S. Army officer. Farming was both his profession and passion. In addition to managing his own farm, he was a Beck's Hybrids dealer for 50 years. He was respected for his work ethic and dedication to agriculture.

Hoosier Chapter Summer Meeting

Our Summer Meeting was held on July 9 at Rulon Enterprises in Arcadia and Strawtown Koteewi Park in Noblesville. Over 30 people from more than a half-dozen Indiana organizations attended the event. We were also joined by Krista Kirkham, SWCS Board Member and North Central Region Representative, from the Illinois Chapter of The Nature Conservancy (TNC).

The morning started with Rodney Rulon and Danielle Randles, TNC Regenerative Agriculture Manager, explaining why the operation was interested in edge-of-field practices and what The Nature Conservancy's goals are in supporting their installation and future installations elsewhere.



Then Rulon took the group out into his nearby fields to tour the two saturated buffers that were installed this spring. While in the fields, Rulon explained how the buffers are integrated into his tile system and discussed the technology that is used to adjust the water flow.

From there, the group moved to the Taylor Center for Natural History Museum Classroom at Strawtown Koteewi Park. In the standing room only, space, Emily Usher-DeaKyne, Diverse Corn Belt Project Manager, shared an update on the results of over three years of engaging stakeholders in discussions on how to diversify the Midwest's corn/soybean rotation.

As the final part of the formal meeting, Park staff joined us and introduced Strawtown Koteewi Park's history and current activities. The meeting then adjourned to the outside tables to socialize and enjoy the assortment of dishes that everyone contributed, including freshly grilled hamburgers and hot dogs.
